Recommended Approach

Task #1 - "Create / Supply a Theme"

- After reading and meditating on the words of this Psalm ... write out a proposed theme for this psalm.

Task #2 - "Not Fooling Me"

- After reading and meditating on the words of this Psalm ... LIST BELOW three features of the fool(ish) that you would hope to avoid in your life under God.
- You are also free to jot a few words or sentences of rationale for each selection.

Task #3 - "Select a Memory Verse"

- After reading and meditating on the words of this Psalm ... select a verse you'd be most likely to commit to memory. (Write out the verse below)

Task #4 - "Take it to the LORD in prayer"

- After reading and meditating on the words of this Psalm ... answer the question: "What Prayer does this Psalm lead you to make?"
- You can answer by composing your prayer below or simply listing some of the "raw concepts / ideas" you'd likely include in a prayer (but aren't currently ready to provide the polish).



Read and evaluate the following excerpts from “Reading the Psalms with Luther” ... feel free to jot down any thoughts you have in reaction to Martin Luther’s insights.

Comments: The 53rd psalm is a psalm of instruction and a prophecy, much like the 14th psalm. Both have nearly the same verses and words. In brief, both of them rebuke the faithless work-saints, who persecute the true doctrine and the true teachers. At the end, it proclaims the Gospel and kingdom of Christ, who shall come out of Zion.

Prayer: Lord, our Savior, fortify our hearts with the faith of Your Word against the foul contamination of the infidelity of these last days, when folly is called science, and is lauded to the skies. Cause us to grow in faith, that our hearts may be rooted and grounded in the saving truth of Your Word, through Jesus Christ. Amen.
